// chair and ceo's report



Proved to be highly successful. We have continued to develop the range and scope of our services and have sought to extend our reach within the State. In particular three significant time limited projects were delivered with successful outcomes. A pilot respite program allowing over 100 families of people with a disability to have a meaningful break proved to be invaluable for many struggling families and a program to reach young carers in schools made significant inroads into a hitherto neglected sector. The third project involved an education and awareness program delivered across a range of public sector agencies which were unfamiliar with the Carers Recognition Act and the rights of carers.

One of the key objectives within our new Strategic Plan was to develop partnerships which will foster awareness of carer issues. Progress in the first year of the plan has been meaningful with a range of initiatives involving Medicare Locals as well as Disability, Mental Health and Aged Care organisations. In addition we have sought to extend our reach across the State through increased visits to regions and establishing a more permanent presence in the south in Albany and Esperance.

This last year has seen great activity in the political and social reform arenas with changes that potentially will have a significant impact on the lives of carers. At State level an election was held and whilst the focus of the politicians seemed to be on infrastructure (rail, stadiums and the foreshore) there was a win for people receiving the carer payment who, following our campaigning, were provided with free public transport through the extension of the Smart Rider card scheme. Probably the most significant reform at a Federal level was the introduction of the DisabilityCare scheme which now has pilots planned throughout Australia. Time will tell if these and other reforms result in the delivery of better supports for carers.

We would like to thank our Board and staff for their continued commitment and hard work. We also have a small army of volunteers who provide invaluable support in both administration and in delivering events around the State. We endeavour to be mindful of our values which include our commitment to ensure carers are able to self-direct the services they receive. We conduct many consultations involving carers during the year and we seek to listen and be guided by them to pursue our mission to support and raise awareness of carers through advocacy, service provision and partnerships.

// financial overview

The financial statements show a declared surplus for 2012/13 of \$248,492. The overall financial position remains stable and within the parameters that would be expected of a not for profit NGO and the balance sheet and cash position is sound. As ever the long term financial viability is dependent upon continued government funding both at state and federal level. A clear audit certificate for the 2012/13 accounts has been provided by our external auditors.

WA Carers Conference 2012

The highly successful State-wide Carers Conference was held on the 23rd and 24th August 2012 at the Perth Convention Centre. With over 400 attendees the event, independently evaluated by the Department for Communities, was highly successful and received excellent feedback. Attendees had the opportunity to learn about available services, recent research and engage in a range of interactive sessions including a World Café event for caring families.

Young People Who Care Awards

The Young People Who Care Awards and Scholarship Program acknowledges, rewards and supports the outstanding contributions of young, compassionate people, between the ages of 10 and 18, who are providing voluntary care. Jointly presented by Carers WA, Woodside and Silver Chain, the Awards are hosted by the Government of Western Australia.

Election breakthrough

With full TV and other media coverage Premier Colin Barnett accompanied by Minister Morton visited the Carer Centre and announced that the Liberal party would commit to a Smart Rider card (free travel scheme) for carers in receipt of the carer payment. Both Labour and the Greens matched this commitment and when elected the Liberal party introduced the scheme in May 2013.

Changing the system

Carers WA engages in a significant body of work seeking positive changes for carers in the bureaucracy, programs and systems that affect their lives. Much of this work goes unnoticed by the general public unless it receives publicity such as the Smart Rider scheme (see Election Breakthrough highlight). All submissions are listed on the Carers WA webpage but three such examples are:

- · Agreement from the Attorney General to provide carers undertaking jury duty with alternative Care arrangements
- Acceptance of suggested recommendations for the Stokes Review regarding the importance of carer inclusion in the mental health system
- Inclusion, in the WA Health Promotion Strategic Framework, of carers as a priority "hard to reach" group for whom it may be necessary to develop unique interventions.

Young Carer Margaret River Camp and FEST-OF-ALL

Carers WA was successful in obtaining a grant from Telethon for a 2 night, 3 day camp in Margaret River. 22 young carers, 4 volunteers and 2 members of staff were able to experience a unique WA holiday destination and extend their networks with each other. A Federally funded national series of events - the FEST-OF-ALL - for young carers to create awareness took place in 2012. In WA the event was held at Perth Zoo.

MH Good Outcomes VC Award

Sponsored by the Mental Health Commission the young carers team won the Mental health Good Outcomes Award for improved outcomes in child and youth mental health. The award presented in October 2012 was supported by the Commissioner for Children and Young People.

Launch of Carers WA Facebook Page

Carers WA now has a presence on Facebook as an organisation with many hundreds of people visiting and "Liking" the site. This provides a further medium for raising awareness of carer issues as well as publicising events being run to support families.

Carers Week

A range of events were run across the State to celebrate the annual Carers Week held annually in the third week of October. Carers Week in WA is proudly supported by Lotterywest. The Department for Communities also provided support for a young carer event at Scitech.

// volunteering



During the year Carers WA Volunteers have contributed a total of 4,637 hours. This equates (according to the national bench mark value of \$24.09 an hour) to a dollar value of \$111,705.

The work of the Volunteers ranges from administrative support, including the preparation and distribution of information packs to carers, and a range of other mailouts, advertising services, or upcoming events. Volunteers are also an active and vital part of our young carer outings and other events, such as social support activities.

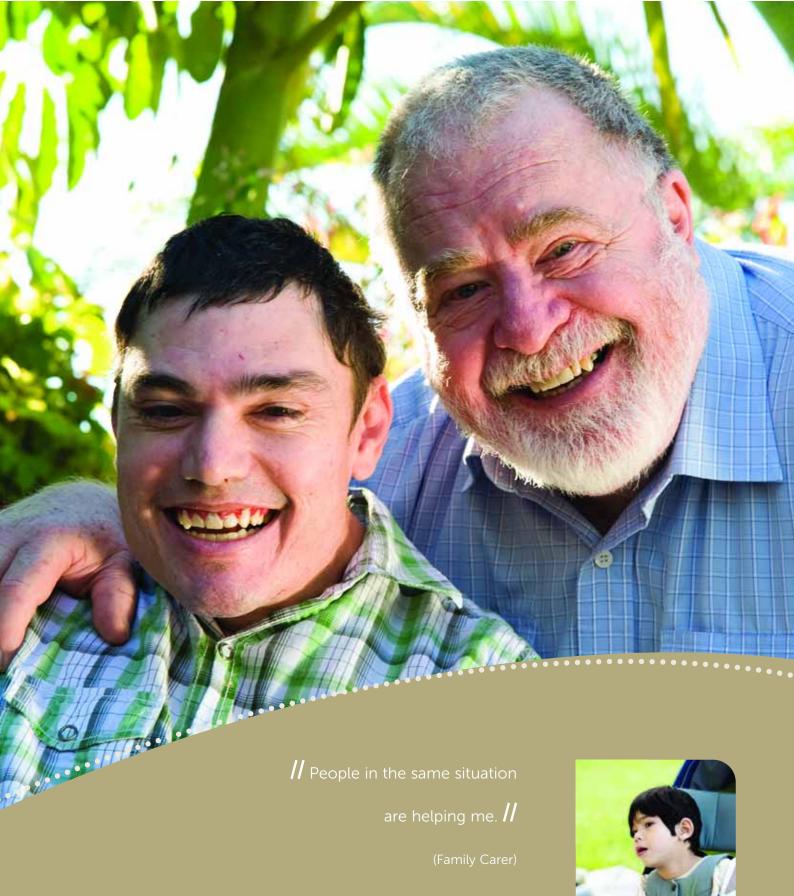

Counselling

Counselling services are provided through individual face to face sessions, workshops, email, Skype and telephone. The Carers WA counselling program continues to provide support to carers throughout our state.

Funded by Department for Communities and FaHCSIA

Education and Training

Training and education for carers and service providers through workshops, forums and expos.

Funded by the Home and Community Care Program, Disability Services Commission and Department for Communities

Carer Representation and Advocacy

Providing support to enable carers to participate in health policy, mental health policy and decision making and, ultimately, positively influence outcomes for carers in line with the Carers Recognition Act 2004.

Social and Peer Support

Social and Peer Support activities aim to reduce social isolation and increase social interaction. Designed to be easily accessible to the carer; relaxed, friendly, supportive, a gateway to access other services as well as providing the carer with a well-earned break from their caring role. Activities include short breaks, social events, and networking activities.

Carer Respite

A hospital based program offering information and support to those who will be providing ongoing care and seeks to ensure hospital staff are aware of the role and needs of the people who provide care at home.

Report on the financial report

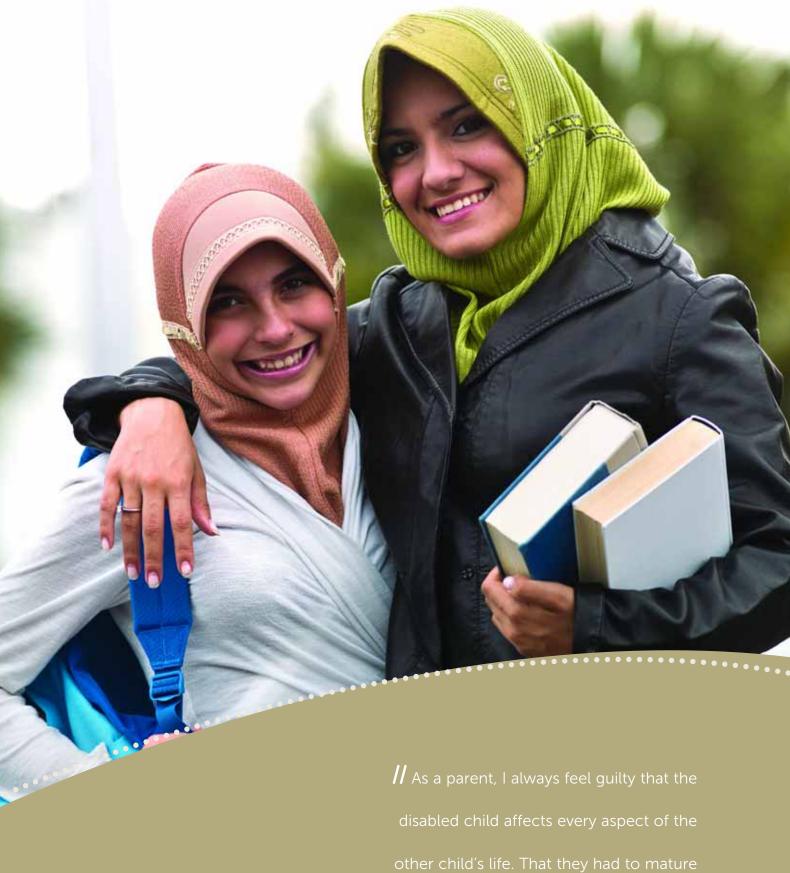
