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### **CHAIR AND CEO'S REPORT**

Last year we published our new Strategic Plan 2015-18 and have now completed the first year. Progress against the three year strategic objectives has been significant at both a state and national level. We have made progress in a nation-wide project to enable the Carer Associations around the country to work together more closely. One of the key objectives of this project is to enhance governance and decision making across the network and establish systems that will generate greater cost efficiency and effectiveness in service delivery. The results of this work should be evident during 2017.

At a state level the Association has been working in partnership with the Department of Local Government and Communities (DLGC) and the Carers Advisory Council to develop and publish the inaugural WA Carers Strategy. The published Strategy has a foreword by The Hon. Tony Simpson MLA and provides a blueprint for DLGC to develop an implementation plan to address the priorities outlined in the document. The Strategy outlines a vision whereby carers in WA are recognised and valued within the wider community and by service providers in the health and disability sectors. The vision also seeks outcomes whereby carers have access to appropriate services and supports to balance their family responsibilities while maintaining their own wellbeing and life outside of caring.

In addition to providing input to the WA Carer Strategy we have also undertaken a range of policy and advocacy work with state and federal agencies. The objective of this activity is to promote systemic change for the benefit of carers. As ever, this work has been wide ranging and includes consultations and submissions to the Department of Health WA, the Mental Health Commission, the Disability Services Commission and federal agencies including the Department of Social Services. Our policy contributions range from specific topics, such as hospital parking, to broader system developments including the ongoing National Disability Insurance Scheme trials in WA.

Although most not for profit agencies are working within a tight fiscal environment we have had a few successes in the area of service development. Carers WA developed a Carer Peer Volunteer service delivery model and

training package. The resources developed are aimed at service providers to assist with the implementation of a model which links volunteers who have lived experience of being a carer with carers who would benefit from peer support. In addition to this project Lotterywest has provided funding to trial an initiative to develop carer support networks to enable carers to maintain employment. The project aims to test and develop processes which provide the carer with the comfort of knowing that, during work hours, systems are in place (technological and human) to ensure the safety of the person they care for. We are working with our new partner, Technology Assisting Disability WA, in this exciting project.

Another element of our Strategic Plan 2015-18 focuses on developing services to enhance accessibility for specific target groups who often find it difficult to access services appropriate to their needs. To achieve this aim we have increased our focus on the Aboriginal community guided by our Reconciliation Action Plan and have significantly increased the number of Aboriginal carers who access our services. We continue to enhance our work with carers from diverse backgrounds including cultural, religious, and sexuality.

Our success in 2015/16 is attributable to the hard work and commitment of our volunteers, staff and Board who we would like to acknowledge and thank. We are looking forward to continuing this united effort in the coming year to realise our vision of an Australia that values and supports carers.

### **FINANCIALS**

The financial statements show a declared surplus for 2015/16 of \$93,129. The overall financial position remains stable and within the parameters that would be expected of a not for profit NGO and the balance sheet and cash position is sound. As ever the long term financial viability is dependent upon continued government funding both at state and federal level. A clear audit certificate for the 2015/16 accounts has been provided by our external auditors.

### **HIGHLIGHTS**

### **WA CARERS STRATEGY**

The Department of Local Government and Communities launched the first WA Carers Strategy in April 2016. Developed in partnership with Carers WA and the Carers Advisory Council, the state-wide strategy guides the Western Australian community on how to better support and recognise carers.

### **CHANGING THE SYSTEM**

Carers WA engages in a significant body of work seeking positive changes for carers in the bureaucracy, programs and systems that affect their lives. Much of this work goes unnoticed by the general public unless it receives media attention. Please refer to page 6 for examples of our key advocacy work.

### YOUNG PEOPLE WHO CARE AWARDS

The Young People Who Care Awards and Scholarship Program acknowledges, rewards and supports the outstanding contributions of young, compassionate people, between the ages of 8 and 18, who are providing voluntary care. Jointly presented by Carers WA and Woodside, the Awards are hosted by the Government of Western Australia.

### **YOUNG CARER CAMPS**

The Carers WA Young Carer Program hosted 3 young carer camps in 2015-16.

- Eco Adventure Camp (Bolgart): held in October 2015 for young carers aged 13 17 years. Funded by Telethon.
- Wild Southwest Camp (Busselton): held in April 2016 for young carers aged 13 17 years. Funded by Telethon.
- Building Strengths Camp (Hillarys): held in May 2016 for young carers aged 8 12 years. Funded by the Disability Services Commission.



### **EXPANSION OF CARERS WA FACEBOOK PAGES**

Carers WA now has a strong presence on Facebook as an organisation with almost 2,000 people "liking" and visiting the page. We also have a dedicated Young Carer Facebook page, offering young carers the opportunity to link together. This provides a further medium for raising awareness of carer issues, as well as publicising events being run to support families.

### **CARERS WEEK**

A range of events were conducted across the state to celebrate the annual National Carers Week, held in the third week of October every year. Carers Week 2015 was launched with a Carers Gala Ball, held at the Novotel Perth Langley and attracting a range of high profile sponsors, including the Department of Local Government and Communities, Department of Health WA and Mental Health Commission. Lotterywest supported the provision of Carers Week Activity Grants, along with a Family Fun Day & Expo in Joondalup.

### YOUNG CARER ADVISORY GROUP

A Young Carer Advisory Group was formed to assist with identifying and supporting young carers across WA. The group provided valuable feedback as part of the Department of Local Government and Communities WA Carers Strategy, identified gaps in service delivery in relation to young people, and assisted in the development of ideas and concept papers aimed at closing the gaps.

### **CARER PEER VOLUNTEER PROJECT**

Carers WA were successful in obtaining a grant from the Department of Social Services to develop a Carer Peer Volunteer service delivery model and training package. Two documents were developed, 'Guidelines for Planning and Operating a Carer Peer Volunteer Program' and the 'Carer Peer Volunteer Training Workbook'.

### **OUR SERVICES**

### SYSTEMIC ADVOCACY AND POLICY

As the peak organisation representing the interests of carers in Western Australia, Carers WA works to increase the recognition of carers and to improve the availability and quality of services and supports that carers require. Systemic Advocacy is therefore a central role of the Association and a wide range of systemic advocacy work is undertaken each year.

During 2015-16 Carers WA were involved in the design of two significant initiatives and changes to the carer service landscape in Australia. These were:

- WA Carers Strategy
- New Integrated Carer Support Service draft Service Concept.

   and Disability Service Organisations.



- Social Services Systemic issues raised with Public Trustee and Office of the Public Advocate, Department of Human Services Community Consultative Forum.
- Aged Care Aged care issues paper outlining a range of systemic issues circulated throughout the sector.

### **COUNSELLING**

Counselling services are provided through individual face to face sessions, workshops, support groups, email, skype and telephone. Carers WA has 5 metropolitan offices staffed one day per fortnight to improve accessibility for carers. There are also 9 contracts with regional counsellors providing face to face sessions with carers in their own community.

### **CARER WELLNESS AT HOME PROGRAM**

This program operates across the metropolitan area, through referrals made via the Regional Assessment Service. Carers are evaluated within the home environment and a range of supports are provided. Supports can include individual advocacy, in-home counselling, education, administrative support, and referral to other services. The focus of the program is to improve the health and wellbeing of the carer with a key objective to reduce social isolation. This program works in partnership with a number of service providers and educational institutions.

### **EDUCATION AND TRAINING**

Workshops are provided free to carers and service providers state-wide. The carer education sessions feature a series of four workshops. This financial year new specific education and training workshops were held including manual tasks and legal issues. In addition, young carers and their parents/guardians were offered numerous workshops with a focus on improving resilience.

### **CARER REPRESENTATION PROGRAM**

The Carer Representation Program supports carers to provide Carer Representation from both their own experience but also that of the wider carer community voice within the WA Public Health and Mental Health Sectors. Representatives have input into service/policy development, planning and evaluation.

The program provides professional development, sector updates and links Representatives to a supportive peer network. The Program also assists committees and other groups who are seeking to recruit Carer Representatives by advertising vacancies and matching carers with lived experience relevant to the committee or group.

Funded by the Department of Health WA and Mental Health Commission

### **SOCIAL AND PEER SUPPORT**

This program is designed to link carers with others who have similar lived experience and understand the challenges of the caring role. The program aims to decrease social isolation, provide opportunities to participate in respite activities, and is a gateway to access appropriate information to assist them in their caring role.

A range of social support activities are provided across metro and regional areas, including social support groups, movie events, short breaks for carers grants, and free to low cost wellness options.

### **CARER RESPITE**

The Anne Bluntish Retreat in South Perth is a two bedroom apartment (with panoramic views of Perth City and the Swan River). This is a highly subsided, low cost respite accommodation option for carers to use which is kindly donated by Ms Bluntish.

Funded by Anne Bluntish and fees

### PREPARE TO CARE PROGRAM

A hospital based program offering education to health staff regarding the Carers Recognition Act 2004, Carers WA services and the benefits of carer engagement. There is also provision of resources for health staff to provide to carers, including the 'Prepare to Care Booklet' to assist carers to navigate the hospital stay when the person they care for is admitted, plus specialty information related to different caring situations. The resources link the carer and the person they care for to supports both during admission and following discharge.

Funded by the Home and Community Care Program

### **CARER ADVISORY SERVICE**

The Carer Advisory Service provides specialist information and support to assist carers to navigate a range of services that will help them in their caring role, including the provision of guided referrals where required. The Advisory team also coordinate specialist information sessions for carers, in partnership with other support services across WA.

### INDIVIDUAL CARER ADVOCACY

This service provides support in the community for carers with complex caring roles who may also be in crisis. The program assists carers to identify key issues and to build advocacy skills to achieve resolution where possible. This service also links carers into other supports (such as counselling) to assist them during the advocacy process. Referrals are made internally following carers being assessed by the Carers WA Advisory Service.

Funded by the Mental Health Commission and Department of Social Services

### **YOUNG CARERS**

The Carers WA Young Carer Program offers a range of services including information and advice, networking, school holiday activities and camps that support carers aged 8 to 25 years.

### **BETTER START PROGRAM**

Carers WA provide a registration service for children who meet the criteria for Better Start funding. Parents are also able to attend a workshop which provides them with information on NDIS, WA NDIS, choosing schools, and funding available once their child exits the program.

### **PARTNERS IN RECOVERY - CARER REPRESENTATION**

Carers WA provide Peak Body and Carer Representation to the Partners in Recovery Organisations in the Lower South West and Bentley/Armadale Regions.

Funded by Community First International (Formerly funded by South West WA Medicare Local) and Richmond Wellbeing.

# NDIS TARGETED AND CUSTOMISED INFORMATION SESSIONS FOR PEOPLE WITH PSYCHOSOCIAL DISABILITY AND THEIR FAMILY/CARERS

This project provided information sessions specific to people with Psychosocial Disability and their family/carers regarding eligibility for the NDIA NDIS and WA NDIS My Way Trial Sites, what the Scheme includes and how to apply.

This project was delivered in partnership with Consumers of Mental Health WA (CoMHWA), Helping Minds and Richmond Wellbeing.

Funded by National Disability Insurance Agency and Disability Services Commission WA, this project was completed in June 2016

# WA NDIS MY WAY CONSUMER AND CARER NETWORK FOR PEOPLE WITH PSYCHOSOCIAL DISABILITY AND THEIR FAMILY/CARERS

This project provided a supportive Peer Network for participants in the NDIS My Way trial sites in the Lower South West and Cockburn/Kwinana areas of WA.

### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2016

#### NOTE 1: STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

This financial report is a special purpose financial report that has been prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Carer's Association of Western Australia Inc. Constitution.

The committee determined that the Association is not a reporting entity.

The financial report has been prepared in accordance with the requirements of the Carer's Constitution and the following Australian Accounting Standards:

- AASB 101 Presentation of Financial Statements
- AASB 107 Statement of Cash Flows
- AASB 108 Accounting Policies, Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors
- AASB 110 Events after the Reporting Period
- AASB 1031 Materiality

No other Australian Accounting Standards, Australian Accounting Interpretations or other authorative pronouncements on the Australian Accounting Standards Board have been applied.

The financial report covers Carers Association of Western Australia Inc. as an individual entity. Carers Association of Western Australia Inc. is an association incorporated in Western Australia under the Association Incorporation Act 2015.

The financial report has been prepared on an accruals basis and is based on historical costs and does not take into account changing money values, or except where stated, current valuations of non-current assets. Cost is based on the fair values of the consideration given in exchange for assets.

The following is a summary of the material accounting policies adopted by the Association in the preparation of the financial report. The accounting policies have been consistently applied, unless otherwise stated.

### a. Property, Plant and Equipment

Each class of property, plant and equipment are carried at cost or fair value less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation.

### Plant and Equipment

Plant and equipment are measured on the cost basis. The carrying amount of plant and equipment is reviewed annually by the Association to ensure it is not in excess of the recoverable amount from those assets. The recoverable amount is assessed on the basis of the expected net cash flows which will be received from the assets' employment and subsequent disposal. The expected net cash flows have not been discounted to present values in determining recoverable amounts.

### Depreciation

The depreciable amount of all fixed assets are depreciated on a straight line basis over the useful lives of the assets to the Association commencing with the time the asset is held ready for use.

### b. Employee Benefits

Provision is made for the Association's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to balance date. Employee benefits expected to be settled within one year together with benefits arising from wages and salaries, annual leave and sick leave which will be settled after one year, have been measured at their nominal amount. Other employee benefits payable later than one year have been measured at the present value of the estimated future cash outflows to be made for those benefits.

The Association is not required to make a provision for non-vesting sick leave in accordance with Australian Accounting Standard AASB 119 "Employee Benefits".

However, as this is a special purpose financial report, which the committee believes that the sick leave is a current liability to its employees, and facilitates the relevance and reliability of the financial report to granting bodies, the Association has resolved to raise this provision. The financial effect of this provision has been an increase in expenses for the year of \$5,135 (2015 increase \$1,479) and an increase in current liability at year end of \$5,135 (2015 increase \$1,479).

Contributions are made by the Association to an employee superannuation fund and are charged as expenses when incurred.

#### c. Income Tax

The income of Carers Association of Western Australia Inc. is exempt from income tax pursuant to Subdivision 50-5 Item 1.1-charitable institution of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997.

#### d. Cas

For purposes of the Cash Flow Statement, cash includes cash on hand, at bank and on deposit.

#### e. Revenue

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

### f. Right to Occupancy/Deferred Income

Monies received from the government were used to acquire a share in a building in which ownership does not transfer until the end of a 20 year period. The Association is entitled during this 20 year period, to occupy the building, rent free. At the end of this period the building will revert in ownership (Tenants in Common with Helping Minds) to the Association. The Association has recognised this rent free period of 20 years as a right to occupancy/deferred income which will be amortised over the 20 year period. (see notes 8 and 11).

#### g. Lease

Leases of fixed assets, where substantially all the risks and benefits incidental to the ownership of the asset (but not the legal ownership) are transferred to the company, are classified as finance leases. Finance leases are capitalised by recognising an asset and a liability at the lower of the amounts equal to the fair value of the leased property or the present value of the minimum lease payments, including any guaranteed residual values. Lease payments are allocated between the reduction of the lease liability and the lease interest expense for the period. Lease payments for operating leases, where substantially all the risks and benefits remain with the lessor, are recognised as expenses on a straight-line basis over the lease term. The Association has entered into operating leases for motor vehicles (refer to note 13).

# NOTE 15: EVENTS OCCURING AFTER THE END OF THE REPORTING PERIOD

In June 2016, Carers WA was advised by the legal representatives of a donor of their wish to effect a gift of property to Carers WA. The deed of gift was dated 9 June 2016, however the title transfer was not completed until 24 August 2016. Although the gift was known before the end of the reporting period, there was some uncertainty as to whether it would proceed. Therefore no provision has been made for this gift in the income statement or balance sheet of Carers WA as at June 30 2016. The estimated value of the property is approximately \$650,000, based upon the Duties Valuation issued by the WA Department of Treasury and Finance. If this transaction was recognised in the current reporting period, it would have resulted in additional income and surplus of approximately \$650,000 for the year ended 30 June 2016 and additional net assets of \$650,000 as at 30 June 2016.

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
