Chair and CEO's Report

2023/2024 saw Carers WA progress into the second year of our ambitious three-year Strategic Plan, supporting the empowerment and wellbeing of carers through our programs, services, advocacy and outreach.

Being a Western Australian peak body, it's important that we operate across the state and represent all carers, regardless of where they live. With this in mind, we embarked upon a bold regional campaign hosting engagements, activities and consultations from Broome, through to the Goldfields, the Wheatbelt as well as the Mid-West, Great Southern and Esperance. This was followed up with over 20 visits to smaller towns and regional centres. To further express our commitment to carers in the regions we increased our place-based Regional Coordinators from three to five, ensuring we can respond to local issues with local solutions. We expanded our peer support groups into additional regional towns young people focusing on healthy eating for a with new offerings in Manjimup, Boyup Brook, Denmark, Harvey, Moora and Esperance.

We also introduced two new programs funded for the 2023/24 financial year. This included the 'Intensive Support Navigator' program which was specifically designed to support carers in complex caring situations; and the extension of our education and employment program, focusing on supporting carers into higher education and new employment opportunities.

Advocating for carers at all levels of government, both systemically and individually, saw us undertake a record number of policy submissions including the National Autism Strategy, the Review into the NDIS, the new Aged Care Act, a response into the Disability Royal Commission and Mental Health Lived Experience; with both

written and in-person appearances into the Parliamentary Inquiry into Unpaid Carers.

From a state perspective we also developed submissions into the WA Youth Action Plan and the WA Disability Legislation Discussion Paper. Nationally we continue to support the work currently being undertaken into the National Carer Strategy and the Carer Superannuation Campaign.

Young carers have been well represented with the formation of our first ever Youth Advisory Group (YAG), comprising of young carers aged between 16-24 providing valuable insight and guidance into services and supports which directly affect them. The YAG also had a personal audience with the Minister for Community Services during Carers Week 2023 and as part of Youth Week 2024 launched "Cooking up a Healthy Mindset"; a cookbook by young carers for healthy lifestyle.

Fundamental to all this work is our unwavering focus on building a society where the role of the carer is not only recognised and valued, but also celebrated. None of this would be possible without the tireless efforts of our staff and diligent oversight by our Board who continue to live our values, advocate for increased and improved services, and achieve better outcomes for WA carers.



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Financial Summary

Seven years ago Stephen received a phone call that changed his life. It was from a support worker explaining that his adult son had developed severe mental health issues.

Caught unawares - his son had bravely downplayed his challenges - Stephen dropped everything and together with mental health professionals, supported his son to stabilise and reintegrate into family life.

At 67, becoming a full-time carer was far from Stephen's mind but it soon became his reality.

Not long after stepping up to help his son, Stephen's ex-wife suffered a series of devastating strokes and developed severe disabilities as a result. In addition to caring for his son, Stephen now had to care for his ex-wife and their daughter with autism who had previously lived with her mother.

In the blink of an eye, Stephen went from working full-time to caring full-time, navigating the complexities of mental health care for his son, the challenges of providing intensive physical care for his ex-wife, and constant vigilance and support for his daughter.

"There's a lot of emotion in my house when you have three people with different types of disabilities and brain injuries and psychosis - there's never a moment where it's the same."

A good sense of humour is vital, he says. His loyalty and resilience in the face of adversity is admirable, but as a carer he needed support too.

Stephen found a lifeline in Carers WA which has played a pivotal role in helping him connect

with appropriate services and provided non-judgemental advice and support throughout his journey.

"When you've lived the experience, you get quite a bit of knowledge. And you live with it 24-hours-a-day, so you're getting that knowledge all the time. And one thing that Carers WA has done for me, it's reassured me a lot, and it's given me a lot more energy, knowing that I'm doing the right things."

From managing medical appointments and therapies to ensuring the emotional well-being of his family members, Stephen's days are filled with responsibilities that reflect the relentless nature of his role as a carer; however it's a role that he would never change.

"For me, it's very rewarding. I enjoy the work, I enjoy the responsibility, and I do get a lot of happiness out of it."

As Stephen continues to look after his family, he is also planning for the future to ensure continuity of care. His goal is to secure a stable support network that will guarantee their well-being in years to come.

Stephen's dedication to his family demonstrates the often unseen impact that carers have in our communities.

Inspired by Winston Churchill, Stephen lives by the motto "never give up, never give in", and his happy, well-cared for family is testament to this unwavering determination and his ability to enjoy the positives when life throws a curve-ball, or three.

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Highlights

Carer Gateway

Carers WA continues to lead the delivery of Carer Gateway in WA and in the last financial year has registered **5,826 new carers** to access a range of services delivered under this federal model. Carers WA has conducted **4,535 Carers Star planning sessions** and have seen an **increase of 45%** in the number of coaching sessions.

Youth Advisory Group

The Carers WA Young Carer team were proud to establish and run the Carers WA Youth Advisory Group (YAG) throughout the last financial year. The YAG, consisting of eight carers aged 16-25 years with current or previous young carer experience, contributed to program development, policies, and government submissions on a local, state and national level.

Notable highlights from the past year include an inaugural meeting hosted by the Hon. Sabine Winton at Parliament House during Carers Week 2023, where the young carers shared their experiences and ideas. This meeting marked the beginning of an ongoing dialogue to ensure better support for young carers. Another highlight was the release of 'Cooking Up A Healthy Mindset', a cookbook and wellness guide created by the YAG to fit the theme of Youth Week 2024, "Head, Body, Heart". The book, dedicated to all young carers, offers a variety of quick, wholesome recipes and relaxing wellness activities.











Policy

As the peak body representing the needs and interests of carers in Western Australia, we continue to ensure that carers are well represented in government policy development and policy submissions. Over the last year we have worked on many key projects but to name just a few, our work includes contributions to the 'Inquiry into the Recognition of Unpaid Carers', 'Reforming WA Disability Legislation Discussion Paper', 'NDIS Review', 'National Autism Strategy' and the 'Mental Health Lived Experience Peak Bodies – Family/Carer/Kin Peak Body'.


Gwabba Koort Yarning

In 2023, our First Nations team introduced a program called 'Gwabba Koort Yarning' (Good Heart Talking). This initiative encourages First Nations carers to engage in open dialogue, share their cultural narratives, learn from one another, partake in healing activities, and enjoy communal meals. The group convenes on a weekly basis and has already made a positive impact on those who attend.



Sponsorships

Carers WA was excited to sponsor a number of key sector events including the 2023 Perth Royal Show Sensory Space, 2023 MND Ball, 2023 Kalgoorlie Spring Festival, 2023 Palliative Care in WA Awards, 2023 City of Rockingham Seniors and Carers Expo, 2024 Palliative Care WA Sector Breakfast and the 2024 ADHD Conference. These opportunities provided a platform for Carers WA to increase awareness of unpaid carers in the community and the services and supports available to them.





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Carers WA in the Regions

Carers residing in regional areas continually face significant challenges in accessing services, notably disability services. They often endure higher levels of distress, increased social isolation, and financial stress compared to the average Australian¹.

Specifically in the regional areas of Western Australia, carers encounter amplified service challenges, particularly with the National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS), aged care, and mental health services. They also grapple with a higher degree of unmet carer support needs, poorer health, and a greater occurrence of major illnesses². In essence, a substantial proportion of regional carers in WA are confronting crisis situations.

The COVID-19 pandemic further exacerbated these issues, leading to heightened levels of stress, burnout, and isolation among regional carers in WA³.

These challenges were highlighted through past consultations with regional carers and service providers in WA. Key issues identified included a severe shortage of respite facilities, workforce shortages, a need for local community supports beyond those available through Carer Gateway, prolonged wait times and high demand for



services, a lack of understanding of regional challenges, and a demand for increased funding for regional services to acknowledge and address carer stress.

In response to these findings and to reconnect with regional communities post-COVID-19, Carers WA has pledged to enhance its existing service offerings with a greater emphasis on regional communities. In the 2023-24 financial year, this commitment materialised by not only increasing our place-based Regional Coordinators from three to five but also through visits and consultations to identify and address region-specific issues.

During these visits, we engaged with a diverse range of community members, benefiting from the unique insights and knowledge that only long-term regional community members can provide. Key concerns raised included a lack of respite and carer retreats, insufficient awareness of carers and carer services, a scarcity of locally available services, and a need for improved service connectivity and navigation.

Carers WA has now compiled a series of reports summarising our findings from these visits, as well as outlining our commitment to address the identified issues.

In 2023, Carers WA was proud to facilitate **94 events** spanning the entire state of Western Australia. These events included capacity-building initiatives for carers, parliamentary house visits, opportunities for rest and peer interaction, celebrations of their skills and talents, as well as awareness-raising activities targeting service providers and industry professionals.

The overwhelming response to these events, marked by the participation of more than **2,434 carers**, served as a testament to the extensive reach and impact of National Carers Week, reinforcing its pivotal role as a platform for awareness and recognition within the carer community.



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Emma's Story


Emma never expected that she would become a full-time carer for three people. But life is always full of the unexpected, and for Emma it all began when she met the love of her life and her now husband.

He had some severe health issues, survived a life-threatening pulmonary embolism and went on to have two more during their relationship. She left her job to care for her husband full time and soon after this, found herself also responsible for caring for her husband's mother who was showing early signs of dementia and his sister with intellectual disability.

"It's definitely 24-hour care. You just don't know if you've got to get up in the middle of the night because something's happened."

The demands of caring for three loved ones across two different locations, 100 kilometers apart, took a toll on Emma's health. She began to feel overwhelmed and under a lot of pressure.

"All three of them had high care needs, I felt like I was being stretched in every direction. I thought, if I don't get some help, I'm just going to crumble."





Emma found Carers WA through an online search. They provided her with counselling sessions to help navigate the emotional challenges of being a carer, as well as occasional respite services that offered her much-needed breaks.

"They helped to justify it's okay to feel like this. You've got every right to feel overwhelmed. You are doing so much and it's okay, and we're here to help you to get through it. So it was just so reassuring."

It was these support services that gave Emma the space and hope to pursue her dream of becoming a nurse whilst still continuing to care for her family.




